Deal and No Deal

Deal

The news came through last week that primary teachers have chosen to settle our claim for greater pay and better work conditions. While the final settlement did not meet all the demands there was sufficient movement by the government to break the impass. For me the most exciting aspect of this was the agreement to continuing discussions around the conditions and resourcing of schools. It is always hard when this is lumped together with pay and the government recognise that although they have addressed one aspect of our claim the other remains unresolved. This attitude from the government along with the claims we won means that we have increased chances of attracting the best potential teachers into teaching and allows us to focus on doing what we do best which is teaching. All this can only result in better outcomes for the students which ultimately is what we all want.

But it's not all good news.

No Deal

Primary principals across the country have voted to reject the government's offer for settlement of our negotiations. The government failed to make an offer that addresses our key issues. We are concerned that little is being done to ensure that being a primary principal is seen as an attractive career option.

While I'm really happy that our teachers won back parity with their secondary colleagues, the same wasn't offered to primary principals. We think that if parity with secondary is fair for teachers, then surely it's fair for principals.

The offer also would have seen some principals in smaller schools paid less than some teachers in larger schools. It's important that all communities are able to attract teachers into becoming principals, and that won't happen if they can earn more as a teacher.

As a sign of our concern we have voted to withdraw the goodwill we extend to the Ministry of Education work that is additional to our day to day role running schools. I will not be participating in any form of work programme, taskforce, meeting with or reporting to the Ministry between July 8 and August 16. I will continue my professional leadership of the school during this time.

Principals continue to hope that the government will hear us and address our issues. We are committed to continuing our campaign until they do. Personally I am grateful for the support that our parent community has shown throughout the campaign. I hope you will continue to show your support next term if it is necessary.

Keeping Ourselves Safe

Keeping Ourselves Safe

Identifying:

- Different types of abuse
- Potential abuse situations
- How to get help and who to talk to
- - What happens after abuse is reported

Focus area 1: Keeping one step ahead

Students learn to take care of themselves in a range of social settings. They learn what the dangers are, who could get hurt and what they can do to keep themselves safe.

Focus area 2: I'm responsible for others, too

Students learn to be responsible for the safety of others by means of scenarios involving the care of siblings and a dependent grandparent, and a peer's need for support when being bullied.

Focus area 3: Finding out about abuse

Students need to be aware of what constitutes abuse so that they can recognise if they are being abused and know how to create a safe classroom.

Focus area 4: Families working together

Sometimes abuse occurs within the family. Children are particularly vulnerable. Students discuss family discipline and stress. They learn that they should feel safe, cared for and protected within their family.

Focus area 5: Reporting abuse

When abuse is reported, the abuser is stopped and the healing process can begin for the victim. Students learn why it is important to report abuse and to know who, and how, to tell.

Focus area 6: What happens now?

Through a discussion session (e.g with the Guidance counsellor and Principal) students learn about the process that takes place when abuse is reported.
